


## Objectives



To enhance operational learning within and outside the organisation by bridging the gap between intent and practice on inclusion through research and training.








## VISHWAS VIDYALAYA

VISHWAS Vidyalaya is an inclusive school which follows the NCERT framework and is recognized by Haryana Education Board. We began the year with 297 students of which 18% were those with special needs. Students attended age appropriate classes and were provided with necessary support to participate in academic as well as extracurricular activities.





One more year has gone by, we have continued to use much of old and time-tested practices with the ones we have developed from experience. To fill in some gaps we identified certain initiatives that were taken for enhancing the performance of students. The journey has been satisfying but there is always scope for improvement.

## Steps taken to improve academic performance

Most of our students are from migratory communities, marginalised by poverty with little to no prior exposure to formal education. Some new steps were taken to improve their academic performance in addition to our regular practices.

### New technological tools

To help students keep pace with use of technology we have introduced.





### Gyantantra-Digital Dost

It is low-cost software based, self-paced interactive multimedia learning tool. It echoes with our Inclusion Model, being low cost, and has made digital technology accessible to all. Ease in use of technology will prepare our students with diverse abilities for the digital age and has made learning easy and enjoyable. A lot of sensitive and important issues like-HIV, sexual abuse, voting rights etc are also addressed in a simplified manner.

### Kant Learning-Smarter way to learn

It is an end to end system which provides a video game inspired learning environment. It will help to harness the energy and interest of students. This will supplement the lecture-based method and does continuous evaluation of students in a competitive setting. It is a low-cost, self-driven practice.

The benefits of both these softwares will be visible from the next academic year.

## Tested practices

### Remedial classes

Most of our students do not have support at home for education nor can they afford private tuitions. Volunteers have been forthcoming in providing additional help to students to fill the learning gaps.

### Science Experiments

Science is fun but difficult at the same time if it is not accompanied with experiments. Experiments help in understanding its role and relevance in day to day life and hence make it interesting and easy to remember. STEM lab is our partner in this endeavor. Middle grade students have been conducting experiments on a more



regular basis and greater enthusiasm for the subject has been observed now.

### Activities and Events

A right balance of academics and extracurricular activities is essential for the holistic growth and development of children. They also help the students to overcome the monotony of mundane routine.

### House Activities

Competition is not about winning and losing, it's about how you play. During the process it teaches many



things – team work, hard work, importance of practice, inspiration, discipline and the most important of them all, sportsman spirit and the grace to accept defeat.

To encourage this, the concept of HOUSE was introduced this year. The students were divided into four houses - Rose, Marigold, Sunflower and Lotus. Round the year, age appropriate activities were conducted. These included – food without fire, science models, quiz, spell bee, talent show, rangoli, and best out of waste.

## Celebrations - Festivals and National days

Diverse religious and cultural festivals celebrated round the year add to true spirit of life. While national festivals teach us values like patriotism, courage, valour



etc, religious festivals inculcate values of secularism, brotherhood, tolerance and their significance. Diwali,Id, Holi, Christmas,Teacher's day, Independence Day were among the many festivals celebrated with a lot of zeal and enthusiasm.

### Annual function

For any organisation, its Annual day, is the biggest festival. It is the cause to celebrate its very existence, its values, the journey and the purpose!



This year, too, VISHWAS celebrated its Annual Day with a lot of enthusiasm and an element of novelty. CEO and Co-Founder of Nipman Foundation, Mr. Nipun Malhotra graced the occasion as the Chief Guest along with other distinguished guests. The theme "Unity in Diversity" was celebrated with a blend of dance and play. The audience was in for a special treat this year. The band, Pallavi Live, with their highly energetic performance, left everyone asking for more.

### World Disability Day- WDD

We celebrated WDD by organising a walk "to sensitize corporates towards 'Empowering PWDs and ensuring INCLUSIVENESS AND EQUALITY'. The objective was to promote inclusion of PwDs in all possible areas of development. The entire staff and students of VISHWAS



participated in a kilometer long walk from DLF One Horizon centre to the DELL office. It was supported by both these organizations. Inclusion and equality has to be a year-long effort from the larger society to make it a reality. DELL and DLF have shown willingness to be a partner and support the cause.

## Sports

Sports lead to fitness of body and mind and also help to develop team and sportsman spirit. It can be developed into a full-time profession for those who want to make a career in it. Despite our limited resources, VISHWAS tries to give all possible opportunities to its students.

### Sports day

Like every year, it was an inclusive Sports day. Games like kabbadi, football and cricket were played in addition to the usual hurdles and other race. The most joyous moments were those when children climbed on the podium with a lot of pride and satisfaction, to collect their medals.



### Gurgaon Football league


Three of our students Aadil, Almin and Asif, siblings who are being trained by BIFA- BRAZIL International

But for the majority of our students, any trip organized by us is the only opportunity they get to experience and explore. Like every year, age appropriate trips were organized.

### Visit to Zoological Park, New Delhi

Children of all age groups enjoy visiting Zoo, more so the younger ones. Students of class nursery to grade II visited the Delhi Zoological Park. For most of them it was their maiden visit. Their joy knew no bounds which was visible from their broad smiles, awestruck faces and never-ending questions! Pictures seen in books were becoming live in front of their eyes. Battery operated vehicles were hired for the mobility of all students.



### Ramgarh Farms

People living in cities always yearn for the simplicity, freshness and natural beauty of villages. To experience rural life, students of grade VI, VII, VIII and Skill development group and the entire staff visited RAMGARH FARMS. This was done with the aim of team




building. It was really an amazing experience for all and a day well spent.

# VISHWAS SKILL DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING PROGRAMME

As we all know that in India, PwDs face many challenges due to lack of appropriate skillsets for meaningful employment. Though disabled people constitute a significant 2.21% of India's population (as per Census 2011) and despite 4% reservations in jobs according to Rights of Persons with Disabilities (RPwD)Act 2016, only 0.54% of them are employed (Source-NCPEDP)

To fill this gap, it is very essential to work towards their education and skills so that they can lead a life of dignity and self-worth.

The programme strives to provide economic independence and empower PwDs and women from economically weaker sections of the society. This would help to improve their self-esteem and create a less unequal society.

It caters to young adults and adults with disabilities and provides skill development for employment opportunities. It also provides life skill training so that they can lead independent and fruitful lives.

With this in mind, three new training programmememes have been started this year in addition to the already running project "Bags of Hope".

## Bags of Hope

"Bags of Hope" unit was launched in 2015-16 as an inclusive model to support in providing employment and marketing opportunities to PwDs and women from poorer sections of the community. This unit continues to provide employment opportunities and also trains them to use their tailoring skills to produce marketable goods.

## Computer Literacy

Keeping in mind our objective of EQUAL OPPORTUNITY, computer literacy is need of the hour. We are training our first batch comprising of 4 students. With reasonable accommodation, PwDs can be employed by organisations, which have the will.

### Art and Craft

Under this, trainees learn to make newspaper bags, Toran, Latkan and Block printing on paper and cloth bags. These products are then marketed along with other products.

### Canteen

Some of our trainees have been involved in kitchen activities in the past. This has helped them to learn chopping, peeling, identifying ingredients, packing sandwiches and cleaning and arranging tables and chairs.

A long-cherished dream of starting a canteen managed by this unit finally took shape this year. It was made possible by EFICOR by providing all the necessary raw







materials and equipment for it. The hands-on experience in the canteen will come handy, when they have their own set-up or try for jobs in the hospitality sector.

Activities of daily living (ADL)

The trainees are provided functional and life skill training that includes self-care, survival, time and money concepts. They learn basic household work like washing clothes, dusting, chopping, cleaning utensils, grooming and personal hygiene.

### Parents meetings

To discuss increased focus on the role of families in providing opportunities at home to make them independent in daily activities, regular meetings were held.

### **ACHEIVEMENTS**

5 students got selected for Training in Food & Beverage (Hospitality) and pickle making in Muskaan NGO

A Therapeutic loom has been set up which is being used regularly by our trainees. 2 of our trained tailors have started working in a fashion boutique

In keeping with the organisational strategy, this year we have identified and sensitised potential employers like Lemon Tree Hotels, DELL, and Wipro.



Divyanshu is a 17-year-old boy with Down's syndrome. This extremely quiet and shy boy, till a few years ago was quite an introvert and now loves to meet and strike a conversation with people. His enthusiasm for dance is amazing and loves to imitate Shahrukh Khan. His talent in sports, gave him an opportunity to attend a Special Olympics 5 days Handball training camp in Agra. His flair for crafts is visible in the finesse with which he makes Torans and in Block printing.



# VISHWAS RESEARCH AND TRAINING PROGRAMME

This programme aims to bridge the gap between intent and practice through various capacity building and awareness sessions. Disability resource centre is an essential part of the Research and training programme of VISHWAS. The main objective of our resource centre is to provide all the possible support to PwDs of any age, living in the surrounding areas of VISHWAS. Our team of qualified professionals assessed and planned suitable interventions based on the need of individuals. In addition, with the support of community based programme (CBP) team, we also provided assistance in referring them to outside resources such as government hospitals, training institutes and aid and appliance providers.

Maximum number of beneficiaries was intervened by the Resource Center and Vidyalaya. For the remaining beneficiaries need-based referrals were made.

Suraj Singh is a 13-year-old boy and has Cerebral Palsy. After persistent follow up by the CBP team, his father brings him to the resource centre regularly, carrying Suraj on his back. As a result, he now has an Aadhar card and Disability Certificate, his gateway to many benefits. He has been referred to Kiwanis's Artificial Limb Centre, where an assistive device to help to improve his mobility, is being developed. This would reduce his dependence and has given a ray of hope to him and his family.



## Capacity Building

A number of trainings were organised for the staff (teaching and non-teaching) over the course of the year. Such trainings are essential to improve the quality of services for PwDs.

# COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMME

The VISHWAS Community Based Programme facilitates community participation in providing barrier free and inclusive environments. Its focus of 'Disability and Inclusive Development' is based on the principles of accessibility, participation and non-discrimination.

In accordance to the Strategic plan 2017-2020, VISHWAS Community Based Programme has expanded its reach to more families and stakeholders. It is also working towards addressing barriers in the community that prevent children and PwDs in using the services and opportunities that are available to others.

## Objectives of the programme

- Sensitize- village, panchayat, block, district and state level government officials on issues related to disability and inclusive development
- Awareness raising programmes for PwDs and their families about their rights and entitlements
- Capacity building of PwDs, including Women and Children with disabilities to participate in and avail health, rehabilitation, education and livelihood services and schemes
- Enhancing opportunities to access education, health care and skill development

## Major focus during the year

- Identification of new children /persons with disabilities

## Major Challenges

- Medical needs for Person/children with disabilities are generally high. Civil hospital in Gurgaon has the facilities but parents find it difficult to access these facilities since specialists are not often present. Their circumstances make it difficult to make a second visit
- Building a relationship of trust requires a lot of investment in terms of money, time and other resources. Sometimes crucial time to take remedial measures may be lost due to this
- Deep rooted discrimination between boys & girls makes it very difficult to convince parents of girls with disabilities to seek help and guidance



Hafiz Ali, a slum dweller from Islampur village, Gurgaon, was leading a very difficult life as he had lost his left forearm in an accident. During routine visits by our CBP team, they spotted him begging near the mosque. VISHWAS team referred and connected him to Kiwanis' Artificial Limb Centre which provided him with upper limb prosthesis. After several rehabilitation and counseling sessions now, Hafiz is earning his livelihood in a very dignified manner by working as a gardener in one of the residential societies. His life has changed for the better and is a very confident and well included in the community.
