
## Introduction of GASVS

Gramin Adivasi Samaj Vikas Sansthan (GASVS) was established in 1991. It is situated in Sausar block of Chhindwara district of Madhya Pradesh. The organization is a professionally managed and committed NGO active in Capacity building and issue-based networking. The primary focus is on the problems of the underprivileged and vulnerable rural poor in their struggle to obtain a life of justice and dignity. The inclusion of people with different type of disabilities, gender justice, empowerment of women, adolescents and youth, natural resource management, and livelihood security are our primary concerns. For the past twenty-years GASVS has been creating awareness in maternal & child health, soil and water conservation, vocational trainings for youth, health including sickle cell, HIV and AIDS and other immunization programs and several other activities such as legal awareness program for women, crèche, primary and middle-level school for the underprivileged children and gram doot (village messenger).

Presently, our major interventions are 'Community Mental Health Program' in 80 villages & Hanuman Temple of Sausar Block and 'Community-Based Rehabilitation' (CBR) of persons with disabilities in 25 villages of Pandhurna Block & 22 villages of Sausar Block. Also, we are in the process of implementing the District Disability Rehabilitation Centre in Sukma District of Chhattisgarh State. The tenure of the DDRC project is for 3 years started in 2017 and will end up by 2019.

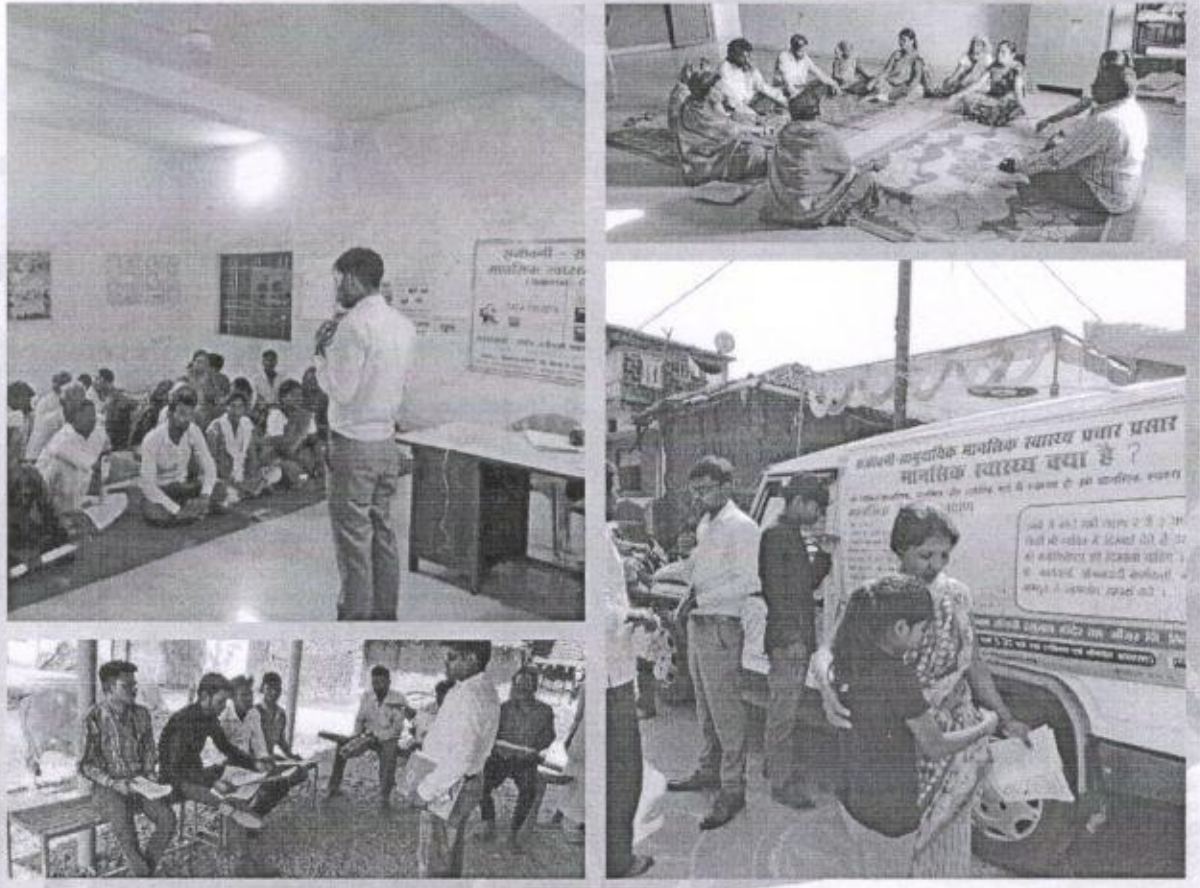

It gives me immense pleasure to share with you our Annual Report which provides details on the activities undertaken by GASVS in the FY 2018 – 19.

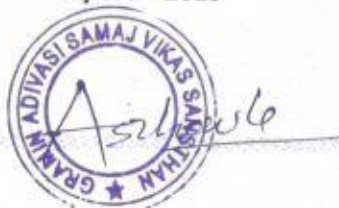

## *About GASVS*

Founded in 1991, GASVS is a registered not – for – profit, cross-disability organization, advocating for and serving PwDs/CwDs in Chhindwara district of Madhya Pradesh and Sukma District of Chhattisgarh. GASVS advocates for the human rights—based approach to disability implying that all PwDs/CwDs need to participate in all spheres of society on an equal footing with their non – disabled peers.

GASVS works on 'partner support model' with likeminded donor agencies with matching mandates. Our funding partners support our efforts that create tangible and sustainable improvements in the lives of the physically and mentally challenged persons who are at most times excluded from the development process. Our intention is to support projects that are sustainable in the long run and focus on addressing the root causes of the problems faced by persons with disabilities.

- To rehabilitate PwDs (persons with disabilities), CwDs (children with disabilities) and PwE (persons with epilepsy) through community based approaches.

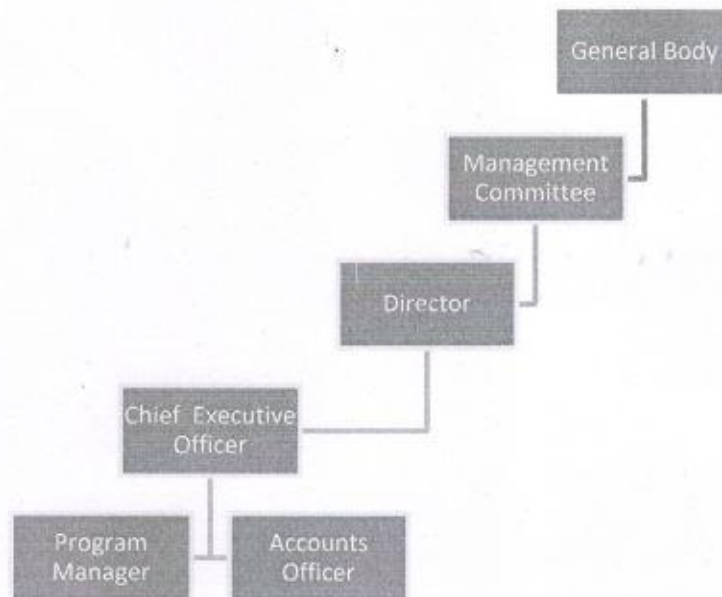

## Projects Undertaken in the FY 2018-19

### A – BDPO

The CBR program at Sausar block level began in 2007. The phasing out ended in March 2017. GASVS had formed 22 VDPOs [Village level disabled people's organization]. They are functioning well and take up issues that really concern them at their level. The VDPO is crux and cynosure of the project. It combines cross – disability and enrolls each and every PwD as the member of the DPO and enables them to act as a group, think as a group and advocate and combat as a group towards their rights. The 22 VDPOs have come together on one platform and merged as BDPO.



Article 17 and Article 21 of UN-CRPD enshrines PwDs to express their opinions and to be part of decisions in the better interest of the PwDs. Coming together as a collective provides platform of the disable to express them and be part of the decisions. The BDPO [block level disabled people's organization] is at a higher level and have elected representative from all 22 VDPOs. The BDPO takes up issues and problems at the block level and advocates for it collectively. It is a more powerful and legal body to promote and combat for the rights of PwDs/CwDs. BDPO will be linked to the DDPO [district level disabled people's organization], to work at a broader level.

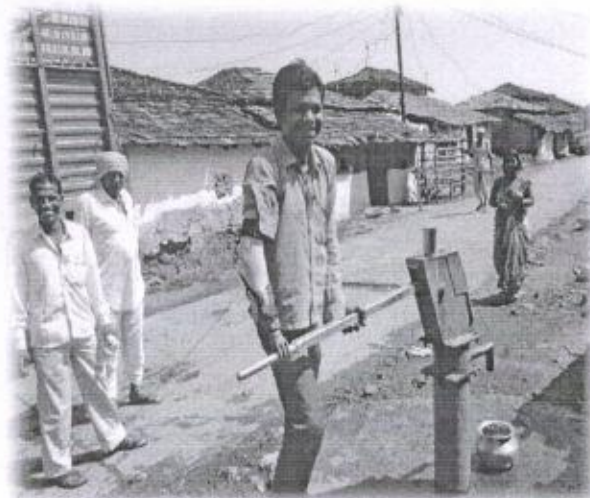
### Key Highlights

- ✓ The BDPO is called "Chetna Viklang Sangathan – Sausar"
- ✓ It is made up of 22 VDPOs and is represented by 417 PwDs.
- ✓ The Governing body has- 11 members of which 06 are male and 05 are female.
- ✓ The members of the BDPO sensitize the community to with regard to RPwD Act – 2016 and mental health Act – 2017.
- ✓ The BDPO members have advocated for providing 50% bus ticket concession for PwDs.
- ✓ The BDPO members support the VDPO members and make them function effectively.
- ✓ 07 BDPO members have received LSF (Livelihood Support Fund) and have started IGA [income generating activities], such as- goat rearing (3), fruit shop (1), MP online (1), Xerox machine (1) and refreshment shop (1).
- ✓ The BDPO has submitted a memorandum to the Chief Secretary of MP state through the Tahsildar of Sausar block for resolving PwD issues such as the proper implementation of RPwD Act – 2016, certification of PwMI, implementation of Ayushman Bharat Scheme and increase in disabled pension.
- ✓ 1300 PwDs have been provided Disability Unique ID cards.



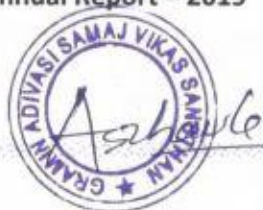
**B – CBR Pandhurna: Mainstreaming and Inclusion of PwDs/CwDs in Pandhurna block of Chhindwara district through CBR program**

'Empowerment and inclusion of PwDs/CwDs in Pandhurna block started in 2015. The phase- I of the project ended in 2016 and that of phase – II in 2018 respectively. The project is being implemented in 25 villages of the block. Community based rehabilitation [CBR] has been recognized as appropriate model of service delivery to provide effective rehabilitation and therapy services to rural and remote indigenous communities. In simple terms, CBR refers to the delivery of basic services necessary to improve the participation and functioning in daily activity.



### *Key Highlights*

- ☞ The Pandhurna BDPO has been established.
- ☞ Field level need-based follow- up training has been provided to the staff.
- ☞ A partner meeting was held in Ranchi on project review, planning and CBR strategies.
- ☞ BPA – Ahmadabad organized a regional training on deaf blindness and multi-sensory impairment and the participants learnt about sign language, Braille, national schemes for PwDs, RPwD Act and have developed skills in working with deaf blind children.
- ☞ The Director and coordinator ensure that gender and disability equity is practiced within the organization and in all its activities.
- ☞ 100% CwDs in the project area have an adequate level of health.
- ☞ 34 educational institutions have been sensitized vis-à-vis CwDs.
- ☞ 20 eligible CwDs are regularly going to the Anganwadi.
- ☞ 53 CwDs and 297 PwDs have participated in the socio-cultural activities of their community.
- ☞ 25 PwDs in the project area have improved extended mobility and 24 PwDs are showing improved behavior.
- ☞ 190 PwDs are engaged in productive activities and are contributing to their family income or well-being.
- ☞ 52 PwDs including adolescents are members of decision-making bodies such as religious, cultural, social and administrative bodies.
- ☞ 12 VDPOs have ensured access to services and entitlements for PwDs.
- ☞ 185 PwDs through their active participation in VDPOs have become capable of making choices for their life and work to achieve them.



### *Future Plan for mainstreaming PwDs at GASVS organizational level*

- ✓ Ensure effective participation of PwDs in organizational activities or committee.
- ✓ Promote the recruitment of PwDs in the organization's different programs.
- ✓ Livelihood based training for PwDs at local level.
- ✓ Linking DPOs to other organizations such as SHGs, CBOs, and other DPOs.



### **C – 'Project Sanjeevani'**

Mental health is a growing concern. An estimated 1% of India's population suffers from some form of mental illness. A comprehensive study ordered by the Supreme Court of India and conducted by NIMHANS and AIIMS (Bhopal) estimated that 15% people in MP suffer from major or minor mental illness. This study was conducted on 3000 randomly selected population and Chhindwara was one of the districts out of the four. Lack of awareness and limited access to mental health care coupled with social stigma makes reaching out to people with mental illness a tougher task. In economically backward social groups, both urban and rural, people with mental illness are subject to neglect, isolation, abuse and traditional forms of treatment – all of which have a negative impact on them.

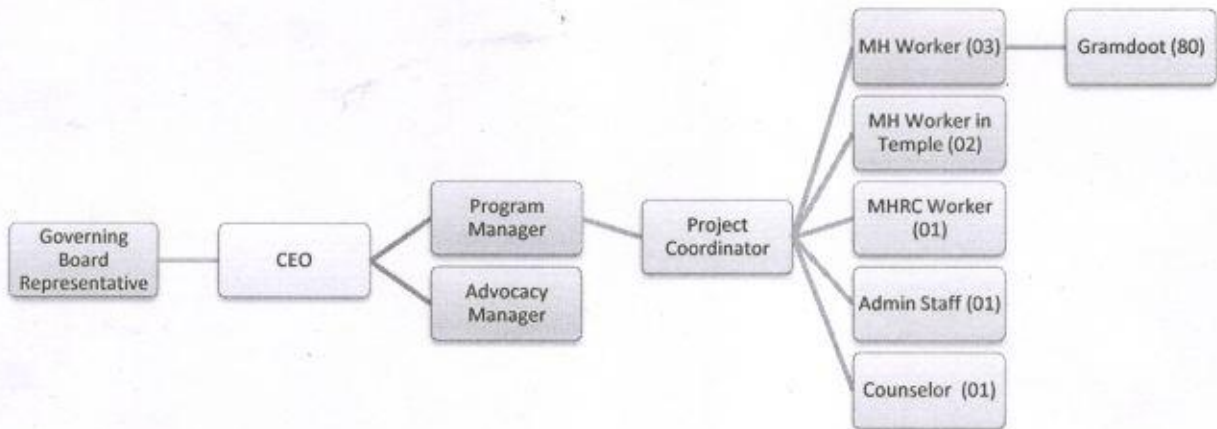


Project 'Sanjeevani' began at the Hanuman Temple complex in Sausar block in 2011 with the support of 'The Hans Foundation', New Delhi. The technical support was provided by 'Saarthak', New Delhi with Dr. Bhagat as the resource person. In 2012, the project withdrew from the temple complex and started interventions at the PHC level. After the withdrawal of The Hans Foundation in 2013, the project was supported by Tata Trust-Mumbai and Paul Hamlyn Foundation-UK. Currently it is supported by Paul Hamlyn Foundation – UK.



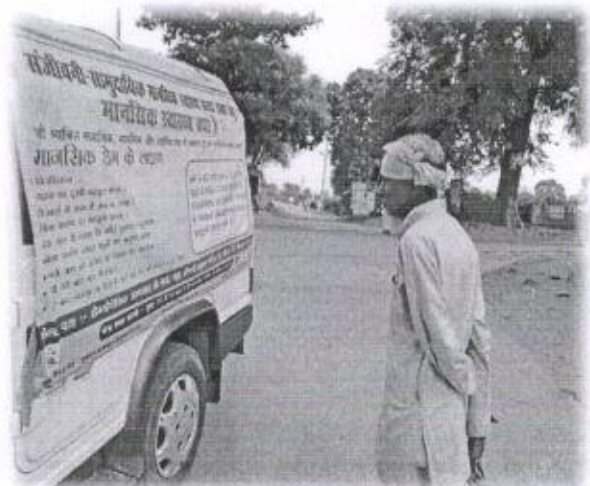
Project 'Sanjeevani' has 03 major components: (1) Federation of caregivers of PwMI in Sausar block, (2) Mental Health Resource Center and (3) Community based services in 80 villages of Sausar block. The program focuses on causes of mental health issues, knowledge enhancement of general public about the mental health issues to reduce the stigma and acceptability of People with Mental Illnesses within the community. It also focuses on the overall engagement of stakeholders to boost the mental health of the community.

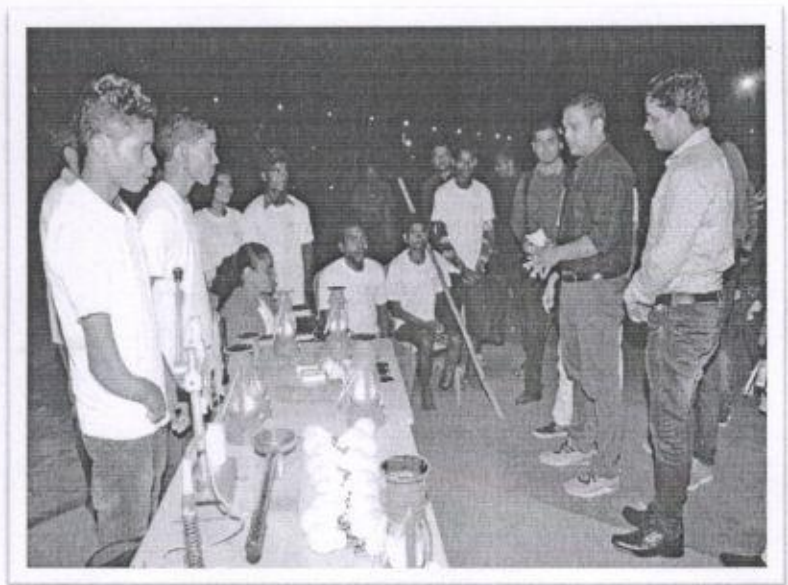
## Key Highlights

- ⇒ 115 mental health discussions were held in 80 project villages of Sausar block where 1028 villagers were sensitized on mental health issues.
- ⇒ 103 mental health discussions were held at Hanuman temple complex where 1059 persons were sensitized on mental health issues.
- ⇒ 21 street plays were organized in 21 villages of Sausar block during 'Navratri' and near the 'Durga Pandal' with the theme 'dava and dua' (medicine and prayer). Around 18,000/- people were sensitized on mental health issues.
- ⇒ Community people were sensitized on mental health through 'auto rickshaw campaigns' held in 60 villages of Sausar block. For further details and guidance, they were encouraged to visit the MHRC.
- ⇒ The Sanjeevani team conducted 08 sessions for 545 students from high schools and higher secondary schools on life skills, stress management and mental health.
- ⇒ MHRC is operating at the Hanuman temple complex. Any visitors requiring information and assistance are provided services.
- ⇒ IEC such as pamphlets, posters, booklets, leaflets have been developed and distributed.
- ⇒ Mental health day was celebrated with PwMI and their caregivers. The caregivers were informed about the RPwD Act – 2016.
- ⇒ Psychiatric treatment is provided regularly at the MHRC to PwMI, PwMR, and PwE. For FY 2018 -19, total 937 patients have been provided psychiatric treatment.
- ⇒ 32 PwMI, 14 PwMR, 01 PwE were linked to Government schemes.
- ⇒ 01 training was organized for 69 members of the caregiver federation where they have learnt how to undertake home-based care of PwMI.
- ⇒ The Sanjeevani team and caregivers participated in public hearing at block level and submitted a memorandum to the sub-divisional magistrate requesting appointment of a Psychiatrist.
- ⇒ 80 gram doot were oriented on mental health issues and were provided incentives for their voluntary services in his/her community.



## D - DDRC Sukma

District Disability Rehabilitation center [DDRC] is an initiative by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India, to facilitate comprehensive services to PwDs in the rural areas. These units have a group of rehabilitation professions for providing services like identification of PwDs, Awareness Generation, Early Detection and Intervention, Provision / Fitment, Follow-up and repairing of Assistive Devices, Therapeutic Services like Physiotherapy, Speech Therapy etc., and facilitation of Disability Certificates, Buss Passes and other concessions/ facilities for Persons with Disabilities. It is a joint venture of the Central and State governments. The central government establishes, initiates and implements the center for 03 years involving funding for man power contingencies as well as required equipments and coordination. The state government provides a rent free building with basic infrastructure, monitoring and coordination of activities through the DMT chaired by the district collector.



The DDRC was established in the newly carved district of Chhattisgarh in January 2017 to provide therapeutic, preventive, supportive and rehabilitative services to PwDs at the grassroots level. GASVS is the implementation agency, where its prime objective is to bring PwDs into the mainstream of society.

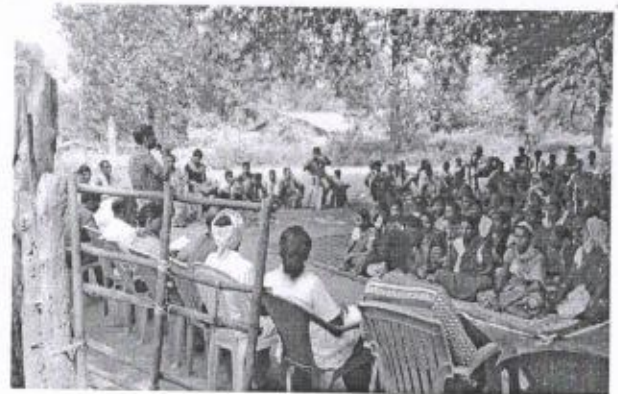
85% of the blocks of Sukma district have a tribal population and the GoI has identified the district as LWE affected. The far-reaching engagement in the community includes identification, certification, universal Id for PwDs, physical and social rehabilitation, focused group discussion with grass root level workers such as ICDS workers, ASHA workers, PRI members etc. Community stakeholder meetings on prevention of disability and other interventions have helped in removing the myths, misconception and stigma associated with various disabilities. We have been able to sensitize various stakeholders in the community, government, health staff, education staff, parents etc.

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## Key Highlights

- ✓ National consultation on the inclusion of PwDs in electoral process was conducted in March 2018, wherein PwDs directly interacted with district officials and discussed the challenges they face at the polling centers.
- ✓ 05 PwDs were taken on a pilgrimage to Somnath, Nageshwar, Dwarka under the CM Tirth Yatra scheme.
- ✓ A ToT was organized at Jagdalpur Collectorate, Bastar, in August 2018 by inviting resource persons from 'Samarth NGO' and master trainers were provided training in surveying, 21 types of disabilities and application developed by the Social welfare department.
- ✓ A session on early intervention and early detection was held with 'Mitānin' (ASHA) on 19<sup>th</sup> March 2019 to make ICDS workers aware of disability and malnutrition.
- ✓ The project has been visited by teams from Sense International – ESSAR – CEO of Zilla Parishad.
- ✓ 1766 PwDs identified, 722 PwDs received Disability Certificate, 40 PwDs has received assistive devices UDID Card, etc.
- ✓ 605 Community stakeholders sensitized.
- ✓ 30 PwDs received Skill development training.

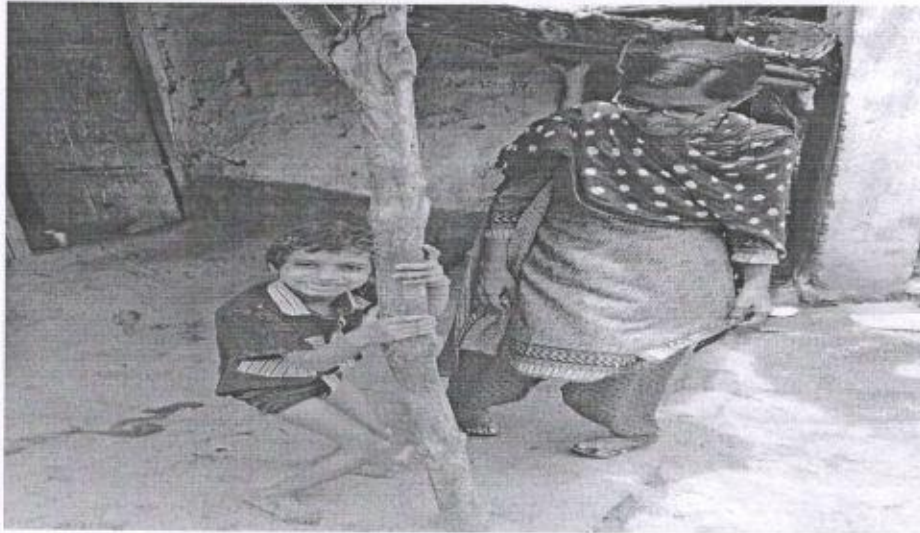
